## Notes from the Pastor



Saying Goodbye

As I think about how to say goodbye, I am struck by the ways in which many of them express encouragement within them. In Latin, for instance, one would say, "Valete!" meaning, "Be of good health." Romance languages commend the other to God: Adios (Spanish), Adieu (French), Addio (Italian), Adeus (Portuguese). English, too, reflects this same pattern: "Fare (thee) well," for instance, or "Goodbye," which comes from "God be with ye."

There's an old cliche among church circles that we never say goodbye, we only say "See you later." Of course, that's true. It's especially true in a relatively small, well-connected denomination like the Christian Reformed Church, where the connections between Grand Rapids and Northwest lowa ensure that we will, in fact, see many of you again this side of heaven. But of course, we recognize that our ultimate hope rests in the comfort that no matter what may pass in the days, weeks, months, and years to come, we will be reunited again in the song of heavenly praise in the New Creation.

Yet there seems something good and proper about bidding Covenant and her members "farewell" or even "goodbye." It reflects the pattern of some of the letters of Paul, for instance, who ends his letter to the church in Rome with these words: "Now to him who is

able to establish you in accordance with my gospel, the message I proclaim about Jesus Christ, in keeping with the revelation of the mystery hidden for long ages past, but now revealed and made known through the prophetic writings by the command of the eternal God, so that all the Gentiles might come to the obedience that comes from faith—to the only wise God be glory forever through Jesus Christ! Amen." Or the simpler close to the letter to the church in Philippi: "The grace of the Lord Jesus Christ be with your spirit. Amen."

Rooted in our English words for goodbye are words of encouragement and hope, prayers for God's enduring presence, and affirmation of the calling incumbent upon followers of Jesus.

On October 1, I will preach my farewell message at Covenant. As of October 2, I officially relinquish my pastoral duties at Covenant. The council and I have signed a mutual "Covenant for Health" that lays out some of these details, in which I make these promises:

- Rev. Kory Plockmeyer is determined to be supportive of the future pastoral and lay leadership of Covenant CRC. Rev. Kory Plockmeyer will not receive negative comments or participate in any conversation or activity which might undermine any program or person.
- Any future contacts which may occur between Rev. Kory Plockmeyer and the congregation will be as friends and not in a pastor-parishioner relationship.

The goal of these promises is to strengthen the ministry and fellowship of Covenant. They are rooted in the desire for the next pastor of (Continued on page 3)

Covenant to be able to flourish. My hope, desire, and commitment is to continue to pray for Covenant, to continue to support it, and to continue to be encouraging of the ministry of this church.

So on October 1, we don't just say "See you later," although we certainly will. We say "goodbye," an affirmation that God will go before Covenant to guide her, beside her to befriend her, beneath her to support her, and behind her to protect her. As I have said each week of my ministry here at Covenant: do not be afraid. Goodbye, brothers and sisters in Christ. God be with you. God is with you. Do not be afraid.


When a member of our church family makes



Did you know that you can support the Christian Education Fund or the Tuition Assistance Fund here at Covenant through the purchases you would be making anyway? Did you know

you can drop a few dollars into the church's accounts by buying groceries, doing a home remodeling project, or making an order on Amazon?

If this sounds like a good idea, we encourage you to participate in the TRIP program at Sioux Center Christian School. TRIP stands for Tuition Reduction Incentive Program. It is a program that anyone can participate in. Local stores (and national too) are donating money to TRIP and it doesn't cost you a thing! All you need to do is buy gift cards through school and 100% of your purchase can be used at a store, just like cash! The selection is amazing and includes both local stores and restaurants as well as most of the national chains (including Amazon!). Covenant actually uses TRIP to pay for some of its own purchases as

well—for example, many of the bills from the parsonage kitchen remodel were able to be paid with TRIP gift certificates!

While many families choose to designate their TRIP funds for their own children's tuition account, those who don't have a child in school can also participate and the money will come back to Covenant. You can specify at the TRIP office whether you want your purchases to go toward the Christian Education Fund or the Tuition Assistance Fund. Either way, your purchases will help a Covenant child receive a great education.

The TRIP office at Sioux Center Christian is located right inside the main entrance (a window just inside the door to the left) and there are order forms available there. The office is typically open Monday through Friday, 8:00 AM to 1:00 PM. We encourage you to check out the TRIP page on the school's website for more information and the online order form.

Solus Christus (Christ Alone: I Timothy 2:5)

Soli Deo Gloria (To God Alone Be Glory: I Peter 4:11)
