Becca's Back in School

I began working at Covenant about three years ago as the worship coordinator. Prior to that, I taught for three years at Unity Christian High School, worked at the Fruited Plain for three years, and taught in Maryland for three years.

Uh, I probably shouldn't say that. It looks like I'm about to announce my resignation. I'm not!

What I want to announce is that I've gone back to school, sort of. In August, Jill Friend, who is employed by Faith Formation Ministries of the Christian Reformed Church, was asked by the CRC's director of Worship Ministries for recommendations of individuals to participate in a CRC cohort working towards a free online certificate in worship leadership through Samford University in Birmingham, Alabama. She gave them my name, I applied, and just finished my first course, entitled "Introduction to Worship Leadership." Next up: "Designing Creative Worship."

This certificate is a nine-month commitment of about 8-10 hours of work per week and includes participants from across the US and Canada from diverse backgrounds and denominations. We have textbooks, listen to online lectures, participate in online discussions, and complete some more formal assessment. In addition, the CRC cohort will meet via video after each course for discussion focused on the CRC context. This cohort idea is a pilot program funded by Worship Ministries of the CRC.

ing and accountability that has accompanied

the first course and will no doubt continue.

Here's a quote, from among so many that I've read or heard in the lectures, that keeps me wanting to learn and read and talk more about worship. This one is from Constance M. Cherry in *The Worship Architect*:

"... perhaps this truthful story of God that is enacted in our worship is one of the most critical needs in our postmodern world. We live in a time when there are many stories vying for meaning. As Webber so directly asks, 'Who gets to narrate the world?' The very idea that there is a metanarrative (a major rendition of truth that is generally acknowledged and accepted by culture) is

all but gone... Instead, 'Today, as in the ancient era, the church is confronted by a host of master narratives that contradict and compete with the gospel. The pressing question is: Who gets to narrate the world?' When we tell the story of God by the sequence of worship movements, we seize the opportunity to narrate the world. People may not explicitly recognize God's story in the pattern of our worship, but in time there is the opportunity for the truth to be caught as well as taught. Proclamation is not only verbal. God's narrative is proclaimed when biblical worship unfolds."

I am excited to see how we as the congregation of Covenant, with the guidance of the Holy Spirit, can continue to narrate the world together in worship and then go out to proclaim the gospel each week.

"Never be lacking in zeal, but keep your spiritual fervor, serving the Lord." (Romans 12:11)


If anyone has ever had an opportunity to have a house visit with Dave Schelhaas as their elder, then they've probably heard these words read by him at one time or another. Serving as a deacon in our pastoral group with Dave Schelhaas has been a great experience for me in the past year and a half. I've heard the words of Romans 12 read numerous times in our house visits. Yet, each time this scripture is read in a house visit, we ask what jumps out to those who were listening and nearly every time a different verse is chosen.

Romans 12:11 jumps out to me as my favorite from Romans 12. But, how do we keep our

spiritual fervor, serving the Lord?

As a parent I catch myself saying "no" and "don't" many times throughout the week when talking to my children, and now as a deacon, I realize how many times I was saying "no" or "I'm not going to" to serving the Lord within our church

Prior to the first few house visits I went on with Dave, he'd ask if I wanted to go on these house visits with him. The answer in my head was always "no," but I would look at Dave with a smile and say, "No, Dave, I really don't want to, but I feel this is a great opportunity for me to learn. So, yes." It's hard to serve the Lord when sometimes we feel we are unable to contribute. Recently our congregation had the chance to serve the Lord by climbing on a roof to help shingle the Mouw's house. Though the number of helpers was low, each person there was serving in a different form that eventually helped finish the goal. Some were climbing on a wet roof, hoping not to fall, while others were clinging to a ladder and doing their part, even though they had a fear of heights, and others preferred to stay grounded the entire time to clean the debris left on the ground.

I think of those who were not part of the roof project and missed a chance to serve. It also makes me wonder how many opportunities my family and I have had to serve in other areas that our church provided, but that we missed. I believe that we are not only getting a chance to serve the Lord, but we can also use these times of service to build community within our church. It's a wonderful time to build a relationship with other members, and in doing so, we're strengthening our congregation. Not only are we providing service to others, but we are also becoming unified as a church

On November 4, the Building Committee has asked that the congregation take some time on a Saturday morning to help clean the inside of the parsonage and outside of the church and parsonage. Yes, you might get dirty. Yes, you might have to get on your knees and pull some weeds or scrub a floor. Yes, there's a chance you could be a little sore the next

day, but remember that we are doing this to serve. If you can't be a part of the cleanup process, the deacons want to encourage everyone to come out anyway to be a part of the fellowship. Even though you think you might not be able to contribute, you are already being an example of service and are strengthening the core of our congregation by just being there.

Please pray for God's guidance to begin a new church that will reach people who are not yet Christians and to rekindle faith in the life of people who have distanced themselves from church life.

10 Ways to Pray about Hunger

As we continue to fill our Peter Fish in preparation for World Hunger Sunday on November 5, here are some ways to pray for those we are helping to feed. (Reprinted from World Renew)

- 1. Pray for participants of World Renew and its partner Angkar for Development of Rural Areas' (KADRA) alcohol awareness program in Cambodia.
- 2. Pray for children living in rural Guatemala. Many parents don't understand the importance of education for their children. World Renew seeks to work with some of the most isolated regions to encourage education, among other areas such as health, and agriculture.
- 3. Pray for families like the Ramos family who has been working diligently in Honduras to implement what they have learned through World Renew's sustainable livelihoods program. The family has established a home garden, growing cucumbers, onions, green peppers, and more. Pray that their garden not only supplies them with healthy food, but also extra income from selling it at the market.
- 4. Pray for adequate rain in Kenya. Dry conditions have left millions of citizens without enough food. Pray that enough rain will come for farmers to yield a harvest from the seeds they have received from World Renew.
- 5. Pray for girls in Malawi who are participating in World Renew's business and entrepreneurship training. Many of these girls are learning new ways to earn income so that they can leave transactional sex.
- 6. Pray for farmers like Lyop who are learning new techniques to grow spices in Nigeria. Her family has been struggling to make ends meet and through training with World Renew she has been able to grow enough turmeric and fennel to sell to a spice processing company.
- 7. Pray for World Renew's village savings and loans (VSLA) program in Sierra Leone. The program assists mothers like Kadiatu who aren't able to earn enough income to cover basic needs for their families. Kadiatu and her husband have five children and struggled to provide two meals a day for their family to eat. Through the VSLA program she has been able to take a loan to grow her business selling house-hold goods.
- 8. Pray for families who have been displaced due to war in Syria. Ahmad and his family were forced to move four times before crossing the border into Lebanon. Work has been hard to find and it has been difficult to pay rent and provide food for his family. Thankfully, Ahmad was connected to a local church partnering with World Renew to supply food vouchers, but the struggle continues as more families are forced to flee their homes.
- 9. Pray for conservation agriculture techniques being taught in Tanzania. A farmer agreed to use his land as a demonstration plot to show how techniques such as spacing, manure, and intercropping could improve harvest. In the past the land usually produced 2-7 bags of maize. Now, it has been able to harvest 18 bags! Praise God!
- 10. Pray for refugees fleeing from South Sudan amid recent violence. Bidibidi, a resettlement area, in Uganda has become home to nearly 300,000 refugees. World Renew is building latrines for those who have been displaced. The latrines will help them guard against diseases like cholera and typhoid.
