Kelly & April Crull, missionaries in Spain whom our church supports, recently sent this story in their December newsletter.

I picked up the kids from school, and Alleke said her religion teacher wanted to talk to me. I look through the courtyard and saw Bea waving me over. She greeted me with kisses on my cheeks and explained that earlier in the semester she had asked her students to bring their favorite Christmas carol to class. Her idea was to have the students vote for a carol they would then perform at the Christmas program. She said the idea had almost backfired because none of the students brought a carol to class, except for Alleke. She brought seven, with sheet music. Bea giggled. She admitted she didn't know any of Alleke's songs. I didn't either. I vaguely remembered Alleke asking permission to look through my worship binder a few weeks earlier.

"The reason I wanted to talk to you," Bea said, "is because Alleke needs your help. She's convinced all her friends they have to sing her songs for the Christmas program, but I don't know any of them, and I'm not very musical." Bea smiled. "Alleke says you sing and play the guitar."

"Would you be willing to teach a Christmas carol to Alleke's class?" she asked. "Actually, you can do as many songs as you like, in whatever language you want. You can bring in an orchestra for all I care."

Three days later I was sitting in an empty

theater in our village while Alleke's class sat dangling their legs at the edge of the stage with sheet music in their hands and singing the Christmas carols Alleke had chosen. Joel, a guy from our church plant, directed the choir while his son accompanied on guitar.

I realize a few kids singing a Christmas carol in an empty theater isn't going to change the world, but I sat there and smiled through tears, marveling at God's way. I knew these kids. Most of them had been in our house and more than once. I knew their parents, and had talked with them about God. Almost all of them, even though their kids were in religion class, had little interest in God or church. Yet, somehow, here was Alleke, surrounded by her classmates, announcing the birth of Jesus at the top of their lungs.






Thanks to all the Children in Worship and Sunday School kids for sharing their gifts with us and leading us in worship through the Christmas Program on December 10! We were blessed!

us to experience both the distressing needs of the world and of ourselves, and the joyful anticipation that Christ is coming a second time to make all things new. To all of our dear Covenant family members, may God bless you and give you his purpose and peace as we celebrate his tearing open the heavens and breaking into our world.

Notes from the Covenant Sunday Morning Discussion on the Evening Service

Prior to our morning worship a few weeks ago, Covenant members gathered in a large circle in the fellowship room to discuss this question: "Should Covenant continue to have two services every Sunday?" The discussion was spirited and frank yet completely free of rancor or pettiness; in other words, it was the kind of discussion one would expect to observe among followers of Jesus.

Council president Mark Tazelaar identified five recurring themes in the discussion, and the elders are now looking for creative ways **to develop them in Covenant's communal life.** The five themes are Fellowship, Structure, Rest, Worship, and Transformation, and we seek to relate each to the concept of Sabbath.

Sabbath and *Fellowship*—What is the fellowship of believers and what role can/does the second service play in developing and affirming fellowship?

Sabbath and *Worship*—**Shouldn't we maxi**mize worship, create more opportunities on this day of all days, rather than minimize them? Does worship have to include a sermon?

Sabbath as a call to *Rest*—Does an evening service contribute to the Sabbath feeling of being busy rather than restful? Would other activities make it feel more—or equally—busy? How do we affirm rest in the context of an evening service?

Sabbath and the call to *Transformed Liv-ing*—Should we stress the Sabbath as an opportunity for transformation in our lives through the power of the Gospel? Do we need a second service to emphasize that God has transformative expectations for us? Will an emphasis on transformation and the action implied by the idea of transformed lives lead to more busyness on the Sabbath?

The *Structure* of the Sabbath–Many of us feel that a second service gives structure to our Sabbath, but must that be only one kind of service, a preaching service? Are there other kinds of activities that could give closure to the Sabbath? Do the other four themes follow from the morning/evening structure or could the structure follow from our understanding of the other four themes?
