


WWW@Cov (Warm Winter Wednesdays)

Reflecting on the January Series...

I went to most of the January Series lectures and learned something from each speaker I heard. These four speakers really stood out for me. David R. Williams, a professor of Public Health at Harvard, gave a clear and unbiased explanation for systemic discrimination of racial minorities in the Public Health system. Pashon Murray, an environmentalist and entrepreneur, showed how she is revitalizing city and rural spaces in Detroit, Michigan, demonstrating that we can fight environmental degradation caused by human activity. Jeremy McCarter, writer, director, and producer of Hamilton, challenged us to do whatever we can to continue to break down barriers in our society, especially using narrative, between black and white and other ethnic minorities in the United States, just as the musical Hamilton is doing today. R. David Edelman, a specialist in Cybersecurity and Geopolitics at MIT, explained why and how the World Wide Web is so vulnerable and how geopolitical conflicts using this medium have already begun and are likely to become the way to wage war in the future.

The short walks from my house to Covenant many weekdays this past month have expanded my awareness and challenged me to do what I can in stewarding the place, space, and time my community and I are a part of.

Thanks very much to Dave Schelhaas and Marv Wielard for setting up and facilitating the often finicky live-stream service!

I enjoyed all of the lectures I heard. I will give a few comments about each.

Mary Hulst talked about millennials in a way that makes me optimistic about the future church. They feel about the world as I do. They find it difficult to use the label Christian because of the racist, homophobic, and sexist attitudes that are displayed by Christians. I am finding this to be sad but true also even though I use the term Christian.

David Williams spoke about racism that is rampant in this country and presented a lot of facts that I think the entire church should hear. He spoke about segregation and how it was successful in creating unequal-schools, jobs, housing, food, environment, and health. It is very sad to hear that this is still happening in our country and we should continue our fight against this form of racism that is so harmful to our brothers and sisters who are created by our Heavenly Father.

Randy Lewis gave us a picture of Walgreens and how they are helping disabled people to live Godly lives of work and fair treatment. I have a niece with Miller's syndrome who works for Walgreens and she says it is a good job that gives her time off when she has a medical condition and treats her well. I give praise to this company.

Shane Claiborne argued against the death penalty and its tie to killing so many blacks who are incarcerated. I am very sad about the tie to Christians who support the death pen--Sanneke Kok alty and how it has affected people who have (*Continued on page 3*)

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been treated so poorly since being captured and brought to this country as slaves and this harsh treatment has carried on even today.

John Inazu talked about pluralism and how it has not been achieved. He believes, and I support the fact, that we should be involved in politics to change this and work for racial justice and to work with people of other faiths to do this important work.

Laura Sumner Truax spoke about radical generosity and how people from her church gave money that was given to them to effect changes in society and it changed how they think about the world and its injustice.

Beverly Daniel Tatum told us about why black kids still sit together at lunch and the disturbing reasons for this behavior. This happens because of racial segregation, economic disability, and stereotyping. She spoke about Black Lives Matter, police shootings of people such as Michael Brown, and how Native Americans are more often killed than anyone else. It was a talk I think we should all hear.

Katherine Boo lived in Mumbai and spoke about how the local people who live in slums are treated. These locals live in the shadows of a beautiful airport and buildings, but live in a system that values meritocracy where the rich are rewarded and the poor are not.

Jeremy McCarter is a person tied to *Hamilton*. This musical has won much success and employs blacks and Latinos as the cast of early American heroes. I would love to see this show and have only seen excerpts on public television.

I most enjoyed Beverly Daniel Tatum's lec-

ture. The lectures are a good place to see people you know and have an opportunity for discussion after the presentations.


Notes from the Deacons

2017 is in the books and, as the treasurer, I wanted to summarize the final fiscal report and reflect on some opportunities and challenges that 2018 and 2019 might bring. I also wanted to bring a note of encouragement from the deacons. We have seen so many examples of faithful and thoughtful giving this year. Together each one of us, according to our gifts and talents, shares our life and livelihood together to make our church possible. May it ever be so and ever more so.

First, the fiscal summary. In 2018 we received \$296,019 in offerings toward our church budget of \$308,471(take note, this does not include Fair Share/Christian Education Fund gifts which are on a school calendar; it also does not include giving toward outside minis-

tries, World Renew, the Tuition Assistance Fund, Compassion Fund, etc.). Even though total offerings came in below budget, we did get close, which is somewhat encouraging to me because we had written the 2017 budget with the goal of it being more accurate to the actual giving of our church. Another item worth noting is that in many areas we underspent our budget, e.g. pastoral compensation, building maintenance, and various other smaller categories. This made it possible to support various outside ministries through our ministry shares above what we had budgeted. In total, we sent \$69,869 to the classis and the denomination. This was more than the \$57,619 we had budgeted for, but less than the \$89,758 requested.

Now, some reflections. I like to think of three main ways that the offerings our church receives help us do ministry in the world. First, *(Continued on page 7)*

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through our local ministry to those in and connected to our church. These offerings keep the lights on in church, the carpets vacuumed, the Word preached, the worship service planned, the bulletins printed, the Sunday school curriculum ordered, the Courier in the mailboxes, and the e-mails delivered promptly and sincerely to your inboxes, to name just a few. Second, through our support of ministries that are external to our church like missionaries and mission organizations, Amistad Christiana, and many others. Third, through supporting the Christian schools in our area that do the hard work of helping the youth in our community to see that all aspects of life come under the rule and reign of Christ and that we can worship and glorify God through learning about the world around us. Of course, there is overlap in many ways. Nevertheless, I think the three categories can be helpful.

One challenge we will face this year and next is to determine how much of each to support. Some say that we should support external ministry first and foremost through supporting missionaries and ministry shares and make cuts to local ministry in order to make that happen. Others say that our first obligation is to the discipleship of our own congregation and, if we are not able to meet the other reguests, then so be it. There are others that want to do all the things well. They might say that we need to challenge ourselves to give more generously to do all fully. This year the deacons will be pondering this question throughout the year, and prepare for tough decisions in December. We invite you to share your passions and visions for our church with

us so we may make wise and well-informed decisions when the time comes.

Finally, a few members of the congregation have asked about how they might divide their giving. This is a tricky question and there is not consensus on how to answer it, but I will venture one answer for those who are asking. If we call "tithes" our gifts in support of our church's budgeted ministry and "offerings" as our gifts in support of non-budgeted ministries, then, according to our budget, one would split the "tithes" as follows:

General Fund: 55% Missions Fund: 7% Building Fund: 3% Christian Education/Fair Share: 35%

We encourage you to consider giving to other ministries as well, but leave it up to you how **to divide your "offerings," for example spe**cial offerings for outside ministries like World Renew, Justice For All, the Tuition Assistance Fund, the Compassion Fund, etc. Because everyone has different circumstances we resist offering a formula beyond those general guidelines; we would simply encourage everyone to give generously and with a cheerful heart, not out of obligation, but with joy that the kingdom of God may grow.
