From the Elders...

An eleven-year old girl in skirt, blouse, bobby socks, and scuffed brown oxford shoes sits uneasily on the edge of the chesterfield (sofa/couch). Her mum has organized her always-messy, straight blond hair into a part along one side of her head, with a bobby pin keeping her eyes and forehead clear of unruly strands. Along with a number of similarly dressed and coiffed younger sisters lined up beside her, she is waiting for the doorbell to ring. It rings. Dad, who is wearing his suit jacket goes to open the door while mum, in Sunday clothes, gives us a final look of inspection and rises to greet the visitors. Two middle-aged men-also wearing suits-are ushered in by my dad; they look very serious and we girls squirm. Thus begins "huisbezoek" (home visit) by the elders of the Second Christian Reformed Church of Rexdale, a suburb of Toronto, Ontario, Canada, my family's home church.

That was 1958. Fast-forward sixty years and we are in Sioux Center, Iowa in 2018! If you are not a young immigrant family, you may not recognize the above tableau. Although, maybe if you are old enough and of Dutch heritage, living in Sioux Center now, it may sound a little familiar. If you are part of the fresh transfusion of non-Dutch-heritage believers into the Christian Reformed Church, you may be wondering what is going on. Well, the above anecdote has just been an introduction to the custom of annual home visits made by pastors, elders, and deacons to the members of the congregation, even to this day (Article 65, Church Order of the CRC). As school begins and a new season begins, so does the next round of pastoral home visits. As we are preparing to make schedules and

get in touch with the families of our pastoral groups, we elders and deacons are thinking, talking, and praying that the visits we make will be of service to the members of the congregation. Louis Tamminga, a retired minister of the Christian Reformed Church, wrote a small book, The Elder's Handbook in 2009. Tamminga comments that in an increasingly individualistic society like the one we live in, people may wonder why a home visit is necessary. People may even think, "What business is it of yours to ask about my spiritual welfare?" (54). Others may feel that they are being evaluated or judged.

Here are some words from the "Ordination of Elders and Deacons," which we use every time we install new elders and deacons and thank those who have served in these offices:

In the officebearers of the church we see the love of Christ for his people. As the Lord of the church he appoints leaders and by his Spirit equips them, so that believers may grow in faith, develop disciplined Christian living, serve others in selfless Christian love, and share with all the good news of salvation. He taught us the spirit of true leadership when he said, "Whoever wants to be great among you must be your servant, *(Continued on page 3)*

and whoever wants to be first among you must be your slave—just as the Son of Man did not come to be served, but to serve, and to give his live as a ransom for many" (Matthew 20:26-28).

We elders and deacons are fellow redeemed sinners who want to get to know you better and to love you with the love of our Lord. We want to know what is going on in your everyday lives and what makes you happy as well as what worries and grieves you. With every individual or family we visit, this desire to get to know and love you better can take on a different form, but the motive is the same: to walk with you and to encourage you as you participate of the community of believers in Jesus and his already-coming kingdom, also in that small part of the Church that is the congregation of Covenant Christian Reformed Church in Sioux Center.

There will be two causes listed for each Sunday. The first cause will be the monthly offering for that particular Sunday of the month. Those causes include:


Week 1–General & Building Fund Week 2–Christian Education Fund Week 3–Missions Fund

Either designate on your check how much you would like to give to each cause, or you can use an envelope to indicate how you would like the money designated. 
evening service, which will be the second and fourth Sundays of the month.

Covenant Sunday Morning This Fall



Covenant Sunday Morning will begin this year with discussions of the book Soul Survivor by Phillip Yancey. Soul Survivor has as its subtitle How My Faith Survived the Church, and it contains twelve essays by Yancey that examine the lives and writings of well-known liter-

ary and religious figures each of whom contributed to Yancey's faith. In the opening essay, Yancey explains that he grew up in a virulently racist church and gradually moved from the positions of that church to more mainstream Christian attitudes and beliefs. He shows how he was assisted in this process by a number of people such as Martin Luther King, Dr. Paul Brand, Frederic Buechner, Annie Dillard, and others.
