The Emmaus Way

Dear Covenant Friends,

On Sunday evenings in January, I hope to explore with you what the Emmaus Way means for our congregation. I trust dialogue regarding the Emmaus Way and worship will prove formative and fascinating for us.

As you may recall from my interview at Covenant in August and from other conversations, the Gospel story about Jesus' dialogue with two disciples on the road to Emmaus (Luke 24:13-35) has played a major role in my practice of worship. In accord with the Christian Reformed worship report from 1968, I view worship as a dialogue between God and God's people that we can view as taking place in five main sections: opening praise, repentance and renewal, Word of God, response to the Word, and dismissal with blessing. Within that dialogue I look to our Lord to perform three actions that he has carried out every Sunday since the first Easter: walking alongside and listening to us (Luke 24:15-17), opening the Scriptures to us (Luke 24:27 and 32), and making himself known to us in the breaking of the bread (Luke 24:30 and 35).

In terms of weekly worship, Jesus making himself known to [experienced by] us in the breaking of the bread translates into weekly communion by means of the Lord's Supper. Leaders and members of Covenant have en-

gaged in dialogue about weekly communion for some time, and I look forward to continuing that dialogue. As I have stated: I hope Covenant adopts the practice of weekly communion, but I do not want the practice to feel rushed or forced. So devoting Sunday evenings in January to such a dialogue seems fitting and fascinating. For example, we can explore how "Joys and Concerns" and the Lord's Supper can go together.

For those able to participate in these formation gatherings, the process I propose will flow as follows: the Pastor will lay out some historical context in a way that speaks to our personal experiences and questions; then we will have a time for dialogue, and we can conclude the sessions with communal prayer. For example, when I think of historical context in relation to my personal experience, I consider that my ancestors were baptized into the one catholic church about a thousand years ago. They participated in the Reformation movement about five hundred years ago. And that thousand year connection to the church and its worship has suffered shattering disruptions for about the last fifty years. What happened to my extended family? What happened to the church, our society, and my own deepest convictions? I look forward to exploring such questions with you.

The Elders and others have not yet specified every detail of when and how often we will hold these formation gatherings in January.

We are praying for you. And we rejoice and give thanks with those who rejoice. May God bless each one of us according to our needs.

A Look at the CRC's Positions on Some Troubling Issues

Since its formation in 1857, the Christian Reformed denomination has formulated positions on:

- issues of personal behavior (May we dance or attend movies? May we divorce our spouse? May we drink alcohol? May we gamble? May we get an abortion? May we engage in war?),
- issues of church polity (Are women allowed to be preachers, elders, and deacons? How are homosexuals to be received in the church? How should we relate to other faith communities? How should we treat racial minorities? How do we deal with what appear to be conflicts between scripture and science?),
- issues that relate to the our stewardship of creation (What did God mean when he told Adam to tend and care for the garden?).

Now you might ask, especially if you are a young church member, "Why does the CRC take positions on these kinds of issues? Doesn't this just create conflict among members of the church?"

One very practical response is that the world—especially the contemporary world—is a very complex place and most of us need some help as we seek to live our lives faithfully before the face of God. Unfortunately, scripture itself does not always speak with absolute clarity about how we should live our daily lives and our ecclesiastical lives.

Furthermore, the CRC is Calvinist in its orientation and Calvinist Christianity is not just a doctrine of individual salvation. It is a "world and life view" where God is more than just a

rescuer of lost sinners. Jamie Smith explains it this way in *Letters to a Young Calvinist*: "God places us in creation as his ambassadors and emissaries, but also as co-laborers, entrusting to us the task of unfolding all the potential that's packed into creation." This kind of work is going to bring about differences of opinion, but the church can be a force to mitigate those differences.

The church puts together study committees made up of serious Christians—biblical scholars and lay people, some of them experts in a particular field—and has them examine a particularly troubling issue over a period of several years and eventually make a recommendation about how we should respond to that issue. A synod or several synods will then study these recommendations and come to some conclusion.

Of course these decisions are not infallible. In fact, many of the church's decisions have been revised or changed over the years. But they represent the best understanding of scripture and knowledge of the workings of the world we are able to arrive at in our time. And always, Christian men and women will be formulating these positions after much prayer and study, seeking to be faithful to God's will as revealed in scripture and creation.

Twice in the past four years, our Covenant 11th and 12th graders have studied these issues as they were taught by Pastor Kory and Dave Schelhaas. Beginning in January, the adults who attend Covenant Sunday Morning will be looking at the CRC's positions on things like "Creation and Science," "War," "Divorce," "Church and State," and more.


