Note from Pastor Joel...

Beginning on March 10 (the first Sunday in Lent), Covenant CRC will take some steps down the Emmaus Way by practicing weekly communion through Easter Sunday (April 21).

As I've mentioned previously in the Courier, when we follow the Emmaus Way in worship, we look to Jesus to do every Sunday three things he did on the first Easter Sunday: first, walk alongside us to worship in a listening way; second, open the Scriptures in a way that speak to our hearts; third, make himself known to us in the breaking of the bread. (See Luke 24:13-35 for the Gospel story of the Emmaus Way.)

Since 2011, the policy in the Christian Reformed Church is that all baptized members are invited to the Lord's Supper. In other words, younger members who would like to participate in the sacrament can do so. The typical practice is for the children or younger members to talk with their parents and then meet with the Pastor and perhaps an Elder or two. In those conversations, we can explore the Lord's Supper as a way for our Lord to nourish us in faith. A baptized member's public profession of faith can come at some other suitable time. In the meantime, we encourage our children to participate in the Lord's Supper. If you have any questions or


thoughts or requests in this regard, please get in touch with me (Joelekok@gmail.com).

Notes from the Deacons


This month, our three outgoing deacons are sharing a few thoughts about their time serving as deacons these last three years.
