## Note from the Elders

Hello, dear Covenant sisters and brothers! At the time of this writing, this elder is visiting family in the Netherlands and Germany, but when you read it, she will be back in Sioux Center, God willing. I want to share with you some information and my experiences of celebrating Ressurection Sunday in the province of Brabant, the Netherlands, a traditionally Roman Catholic area of the Netherlands, which is now very secular. We celebrated Easter in a small Protestant church in a small town, Someren.

A little background information on the Protestantse Kerk van Nederland or PKN. In the 1960's with a continuing decline in membership in all churches in the Netherlands, a group of Protestant churches formed a group called Samen op Weg or "going forward together." This was an ecumenical group that sought to unify the many different protestant churches in the Netherlands. In 2006, the PKN, as a result of the Samen op Weg movement, was established. It includes the Reformed churches, and the Lutheran churches. A number of orthodox and liberal Protestant churches did not join because of theological differences. According to a quick bit of internet research, in 2018, 9% of the Dutch population belonged to the PKN; another 9% belonged to other Protestant churches; about 21% were Catholic; and 5% Muslim. The rest of the population was agnostic or atheist. That's more than half of the population.

We arrived at the little 18th century church building, and our party of eight were able to squeeze in by ones and twos into the packed church. I think the church held between 75 and 80 people. We celebrated Christ's resurrection with beautiful trumpet and organ music and a message based on the apostle John's account of resurrection morning. The pastor talked about how Christ's resurrection gives us all a new beginning—again and again. She spoke about the different responses Mary Magdalene, Peter, and John had to the empty grave and pointed out how very much like Peter, Mary, and John, we still are today! And this good news of the resurrection and the coming-again-in-glory of Jesus still motivates us this very moment, to live lives of love and gratitude and witness to our Redeemer for our world and our neighbour.

As I was looking into the make-up of religious affiliation in the Netherlands, my 14-year-old grandson asked, "Grandma, why can't we just all get along together?" Why, indeed? It's my prayer that my family, my church family, and all of God's children, look to Jesus for the fulfilment of that deep longing. Happy Easter—today and every day. He is risen indeed! dark.

## Serving at Covenant

This is part of an ongoing series about the many ways Covenant members serve in our church, our community, and beyond.

Volunteering opportunities living in a senior citizens' RV park in Mission, Texas are many. Parking cars, baking pies, serving donuts and coffee at the monthly craft show, setting up chairs for Sunday worship services or special events, driving neighbors to the hospital for treatments or appointments, keeping an eye on the lady who lives down the street because she has dementia, or the gentleman next door who's been falling and having seizures. There is always someone in the park who is sick or has lost a loved one who would love a visit or just a card.

Outside our fenced community, however, the needs and opportunities are many and different. At the Mission hospital, 160 babies are born each month. All babies leave the hospital with a blanket (many come to have their babies taking nothing with them). Most blankets are crocheted or quilted and donated by winter Texans. I challenge myself to make 10-15 each season (a mere drop in the bucket). I also make smaller, soft blankets for babies who do not survive. These babies are wrapped in them to be buried in. I call them my "Joseph of Arimathea" blankets (John 19:38-40). They never tell me if I make too many or not enough and maybe I don't want to know.

A group of women also get together to make stuffed animals for the Mission hospital. This past season we made and donated a little over 600 stuffed animals to be given to babies and kids.

We have workshops each season to make mattresses. They are made of upholstery fabric and each are stuffed with 900-1000 plastic bags. These are given to kids who attend Bible School at a mission called "His Hands Ministry." To receive a mattress, they are required to attend each of the 6 days Bible School is held and know the daily Bible verse in both Spanish and English. These kids sleep on the floor, so they treasure having a mattress. We also give them to an orphanage in Mexico. The beds there are made of wood, so the mattresses make them a little more comfortable. This year, while ringing bells for the Salvation Army, we got to know the commander and he was excited about our mattresses, so we added them to our list of recipients. When their facility is full, they must send the homeless away to go sleep in the park nearby. They are happy to be able to give them a mattress to at least get them off the ground to sleep.

Three years ago we adopted a family of five who live in McAllen, Texas. The father is African-American and the mother is from Mexico. We met James while he was working at Wendv's. He was a real character and we pretty much fell in love with the guy. When asked if we could adopt him and his family to be part of ours, he readily agreed. Since then, their family has grown by two (two more boys). They now have four sons and one daughter. They moved to Mission because they had a house fire in McAllen. Five of the seven family members have birthdays in the four months we are there and they invite us to celebrate with them. The past two years they have also invited us to have Christmas with them, so that has been fun. They have a small Christmas tree, but no gifts under it. That makes our hearts sad.

This past year we befriended a man who appears to be homeless. When asked, he said he had no address, but does have a PO box num-

ber. He is a small, unshaven little man who wears the same very worn, not so clean clothes all the time. We have been meeting with him at Whataburger on Saturday nights to share a meal and good conversation. Ask Ed about Harold. It's an interesting story.

God has blessed us by giving us many opportunities to volunteer plus good Christian friends, and even friends who claim they are ordained priests of Satan. They complain about all the praying we do at the park, but have been coming back for 12 years now. Maybe one of these days they will give their hearts to Jesus. We pray that will happen. God is good.
