Notes from the Elders

There is a time for everything, and a season for every activity under heaven:

a time to be born and a time to die, a time to plant and a time to uproot, a time to kill and a time to heal, a time to tear down and a time to build, a time to weep and a time to laugh, a time to mourn and a time to dance, a time to scatter stones and a time to gather them,

a time to **embrace** and a time to **refrain**, a time to **search** and a time to **give up**, a time to **keep** and a time to **throw away**, a time to **tear** and a time to **mend**, a time to **be silent** and a time to **speak**, a time to **love** and a time to **hate**, a time for **war** and a time for **peace**. (Ecclesiastes 3:1-8)

Dear Covenant brothers and sisters, when I look at the above passage and notice the many pairs of opposite actions, I recognize in the life of my immediate family as well as in the life of our church family, that many of us have experienced or been engaged in some form of these opposing activities. It's comforting to know that the preacher tells us that all these things are appropriate in their time. Things keep changing. Including in the congregation of Covenant CRC.

In the church calendar we will soon change from "ordinary time," the period of time between Easter Sunday and the first Sunday in Advent, and "Advent," the time of waiting and preparing for the coming of Jesus Christ in glory and the celebration of his birth in a little town in Israel, a couple of thousand years ago. The season of Advent will bring with it a couple of changes in our services that the elders want you to know about. The first is that we plan to celebrate sharing the bread and wine of communion that the Lord so freely gives us, each Sunday. We hope you will accept this gift with gratitude for our Lord's love for us. Second, the elders and the Worship Committee have been talking about introducing an "elder of service." What is an elder of service, you may ask? She or he is one of the current elders who will be on a rotation to serve as the pastor's right-hand man or woman. This person will pray for a blessing on the pastor, congregation, and service prior to the service, as is already done, but this person would also be prepared to lead the service should pastor Joel be incapacitated in any way. To use his own example-should he slip and fall on the ice on the way between parsonage and church some icy Sunday morning. (God forbid!)

The season of Advent also brings with it the annual Sunday School Christmas program. A couple of our young people and an experienced elder and teacher have put together a wonderful program and the Sunday School kids are busy preparing for it.

May God bless us as a congregation as we enter this new season. In these times of violence in our own nation and around the world, it is good to know that Christ will come again to make all things new.

Dara Lo was married in our church-we were all invited and we enjoyed lots of egg rolls!

Today, Dara and her husband, Mike Rasavanh, are missionaries, bringing God's love and the good news of Jesus Christ back to the people of Southeast Asia: Thailand, Laos, Vietnam, Cambodia, and Myanmar. They are supported by New Life Church of Sioux Center.

Notes from the Deacons

First, I want to remind everyone of the congregational meeting on December 9. That evening we will enjoy a lasagna supper put on as a fundraiser for the youth group and then go over the church budget which has been prepared and approved by the church council. At the end of the evening, there is a vote for the church as a whole to approve the budget, of course.

Second, as we wind down the year, we've seen a few things in regards to the church's budget. Our giving overall is behind what we had budgeted, but thankfully, our spending is down that much as well. As Treasurer Adam Fedders said in our last meeting, "We're breaking even. Barely."

However, this is not the gloom and doom scenario that it may seem. As I write this, I just can't find a way to say we're doing ok financially without it seeming a negative. God has richly blessed our congregation, and our congregation has done a great job of returning those blessings; one of those ways is in the form of the offerings.

By looking at where your gifts have been designated, we can see the priorities of Covenant. Two that stand out to me are missions and being caring and compassionate. Those two funds are fully funded year in and year out. We know our missionaries, we love our missionaries, we support our missionaries. The same is true with the Compassion Fund—when we know of a need, we are able to step in and help out, knowing there is money sitting in the fund from members of Covenant for just such an occasion.

As we finish up this year, knowing that the Missions Fund is flush, we deacons have decided to make a few changes to even out the rest of the General Fund. For the short foreseeable future, the Missions Fund will be taken off of the offering schedule and will be replaced with a General Fund offering. It's our hope to build up the Building Fund and get ministry shares its share of the offering, too. We will be keeping a close eye on those funds as time goes by, and when they start to show a need for more giving, we can insert them back into the offering schedule.

For you all out there, we're suggesting giving be shifted to the Christian Education Fund and the General Fund. Of course, any moneys designated to either the Missions Fund or the Compassion Fund will go to those.

Advent Devotionals

God promises a future kingdom with "no more death or mourning or crying or pain," (Revelation 21:4) but that's hard to imagine in the present moment. Headlines from 2019 include terror attacks in New Zealand and Sri Lanka, persecution in Myanmar, political unrest in Hong Kong, and economic despair in Venezuela. Over 20 million people are fleeing persecution, war, or violence and rising global temperatures are contributing to unprecedented natural disasters that have a tragic toll on human life.

Throughout scripture, God's people call to him, asking, "how long, Lord?" and oftentimes, whether by our own despair or looking at the pain of the world around us, we ask the same question: "How long, Lord?"

In this advent season, we join the prophets and all creation "in eager expectation" of the coming of a new kingdom where peace and justice reign (Romans 8:19). Just as the prophets could rely on the God of Jacob who promised to go with him and not leave him (Genesis 28:15), so we can rely on the God who sent his "one and only Son" to save us from our sins (John 3:16). As we continue to wrestle with despair and ask, "How long, Lord?" we can have hope that our pain will not be forever and that the God who made us is with us, now and forever.

Serving at Covenant

This is part of an ongoing series about the many ways Covenant members serve in our church, our community, and beyond.

We just completed another 12-week season as assistant leaders in GriefShare group. Our group works under the auspices of Love INC. and Trinity CRC in Rock Valley.

GriefShare provides support and guidance for people who have lost a loved one. In each weekly session, a video about some aspect of the grief experience is shown; it might deal with topics such as the impact grief may bring to relationships or it may be about dealing with anger toward God. These highly professional videos commonly show brief interviews with people who are struggling with the issue and professional counselors giving Biblical advice and comment. Each weekly session also includes discussion of the video and Bible passages. The sessions can be very helpful to those who are grieving.

If you or someone you know is dealing with grief, consider joining a GriefShare group or encouraging friends to join.

In Search of The Light: Baby Canaan in Three Acts

Holding his little light, he toddles behind the processional— Sunday school children from tallest to shortest walking in two-tone tan robes to the Bethlehem set at the front of the church. Baby Canaan trails a few steps behind, until his father sweeps him up.

Canaan's votive candlerealistic, but not realslips from baby fingers, tumbling one two three rows up, appearing at my ankles. I pick it up and turn back, only to see his father pointing down, down to my feet where Baby Canaan crawls in search of his light. Scooping him up, I wonder: Will he cry? (We've never met.) But I receive only a wide-eyed gaze of guilt? Of curiosity? Of beauty. I pass Canaan to his father, waiting at the end of our row.

Back on his feet, the service almost complete, Baby Canaan joins in Christmas hymns with squeals and shrieks while ambling up the side aisle toward Bethlehem. Folks turn and smile. His father bends down to catch him once more.

"He's his own show," my husband remarks at the program's close. Canaan's father laughs, nods, agrees. And I go home smiling and pondering the faith of a child.
