Serving at Covenant

This is part of an ongoing series about the many ways Covenant members serve in our church, our community, and beyond.

I was asked to write about how I volunteer at Sioux Center Health. I started volunteering for Diabetes Education back in 2007. There are many booklets and hand-outs that must be prepared for all different clients that have diabetes. Back in the old hospital I had to copy lots of information on colored paper and then assemble into the booklets handed out for the different situations. There are classes for pre-diabetes, gestational diabetes, and more. There was a need for these to be translated into Spanish and so I was soon making all booklets, etc. in Spanish and English.

The new hospital was a great transition for the Diabetes Department. There were conference rooms that I could work in, a new color printer that printed two-sided, and a storage room for supplies. I was asked to keep the storage room organized. I did filing, mailings, and even patient changes in the database. Every week was interesting to see what projects needed to be done. However, Covid ended my work there. The good news is the hospital will be hiring a new employee to work part-time as an administrative assistant for diabetes education and the nutritionist.

As plans for a new hospital came about, a gift shop was added. It was decided to staff it with volunteers. I signed up and was given Tuesday afternoon for my time. I have the privilege of working with Kris Altena who is the part-time director of the gift shop. Some of my work varies as there are projects I help Kris with. The most important job is to meet and greet people as they come into the gift shop. We also assist them in looking for specific items. The computer system was easy to learn. It is not always busy, so they allow the volunteers to read. The hospital staff are great customers and appreciate having the gift shop there to save them time in picking up presents for family and friends. We welcome everyone to shop here.

The gift shop sells homemade bars, candy bars, and gum. They sell hot chocolate, pop, and even Starbucks. Melissa and Doug toys, books and puzzles, and baby items are always in stock. Candles, cards, purses, Walk by Faith jewelry, and home décor are available to purchase. There is free coffee to enjoy as you shop. Please stop by and enjoy shopping at the gift shop!
