Notes from the Deacons

"But just as you excel in everything—in faith, in speech, in knowledge, in complete earnestness and in your love for us—see that you all excel in this grace of giving... Each man should give what he has decided in his heart to give, not reluctantly or under compulsion, for God loves a cheerful giver. (2 Corinthians 8:7, 9:7)

As you may know, budget season is upon us again. As deacons we spent part of our October and November meetings discussing the upcoming budget and what our needs, wants, desires, and missions are. We all have things we'd like to see funded and ways we think these things can or should get funded, but ultimately the only way our budget gets funded is by financial gifts from each one of us.

We are all blessed in many ways and can give in many different ways. Some can give financially, some with their talents of music, some with gifts of labor; they are all great gifts. I would like to take time to talk to you about financial gifts.

In December 2019, we committed to a 2020 Budget of \$303,056. This was approved before we knew we would be working through the implications of COVID-19. When COVID hit, I was concerned we would see a drop in our giving so we looked at adding some electronic version of giving so that our members could stay engaged and active in their giving. All the methods we have implemented have worked well and members continue to faithfully give every week.

As of the end of October, our General Fund giving was running \$32,221.51 under budget. While this seems like we are a long way off, there is some silver lining in this when you consider all things. In 2019, we were roughly \$30k under budget at the end of October. To date our giving is up compared to 2019 and 2018. We have received roughly \$800 more than 2019 and \$20,000 more than 2018. Along with this positive news, our expenses are lower this year as well. We have spent \$12,000 less than 2019 and \$15,000 less than 2018.

With the great news that giving is up compared to previous years and expenses are down compared to previous years some might say—we got this in the bag! We still have obligations to meet and would really like to fulfill our budget commitment. To meet our General Fund Budget amount, we will need \$77,454.21 to complete the year. Wowzer—you might say. How in the world are we going to do that? Well I have good news—I have faith in our congregation because we can do great things when we work together.

Our Missions Fund and Building Fund are doing well. We do a great job of supporting our missionaries and we are finding ways to keep our building in good working condition for minimal costs.

Lastly, we have the Christian Education Fund or the Legacy Plan. We do not pay for any of our Legacy Plan commitments from our General Fund—this is 100% funded by the gracious giving of each you. Currently we have a commitment to our Christian schools (Sioux Center, Western, and Unity) of roughly \$16,000 a month. When you couple that monthly commitment to our General Fund commitment, we need roughly \$54,000 a month for the next two months.

Together we can do this. We can support each other and work together to accomplish great things. Let's finish the year strong so that we (Continued on page 7)
