Note from the Elders

The executive committee of the Council spent a good deal of time this week thinking about how our congregational life will look in relation to COVID as we head into the New year, realizing the different priorities and choices that individual members and families are making. The following decisions are a result of conversations with the Education Committee, Executive Council, and individual member feedback and concern that has been shared with Council:

- We voted to continue rotating three pastoral groups each week until February
 21st, the first Sunday of Lent. This decision was made in consideration of the current COVID levels and the desire to provide a safe worship space for Covenant members that will allow for social distancing and following the COVID protocol of wearing masks. If families and/or individuals would like to attend each week outside of this rotation, they are welcome to do so. Please continue to let either Sara or Melissa know so that we can monitor safe social distancing.
- 2. Due to ongoing high COVID rates in our area, we voted to delay the start of Sunday School and Children in Worship until February 21st, the first Sunday in Lent. We will continue to work with the Education Committee on creative ways for children of all ages to participate in worship and faith formation activities.
- 3. Executive Council also voted to delay Covenant Sunday Morning for the remainder of the school year. Our decision was influenced by the lack of those willing to lead at this time and the low interest in attending among past participants when surveyed by the Education Committee.

- We will re-examine what CSM can look like in the fall.
- 4. Finally, beginning in January, we will open the nursery for parents with small children to use during Sunday morning worship. We will not be staffing the nursery with volunteers but will make sure the nursery is open for families as needed.

Thank you for your continued support of the Council as we face challenging circumstances and ongoing decision making in relationship to COVID. As always, if you have concerns that you would like Council to address, please share them with any member of Council and we will prayerfully consider.

Calvin Symposium on Worship 2021

Sometimes a global pandemic opens up opportunities we might otherwise not have had! Over the years, Covenant has sent a few worship planners and staff members to the Calvin Symposium on Worship in Grand Rapids occasionally, and it has been a wonderful time of learning and renewal for those who have attended. But not everyone is able to travel to Grand Rapids in January for this event. The good news is, thanks to the pandemic, this year the symposium is all free and online, so each of you has the opportunity to get a little taste of the experience from your own homes!

This online experience is designed for all kinds of learners: students, faculty, artists, musicians, pastors, preachers, scholars, teachers, worship leaders and planners, and all interested worshipers around the world. More than 90 contributors have added their wisdom and insights to this online experience. The online Symposium on Worship offers 20 livestream worship services and 20 webinar sessions weekdays from January 6-26 as well

as on-demand content that allows you to access material at your own pace and time. The symposium organizers encourage you to engage the content by posting your insights and wisdom on the content pages and to read and reflect on the responses posted by others. In doing so, we can look forward to being a global learning community.

The livestream worship services take us around the globe to a variety of worshiping communities. Six of these services feature texts from Romans 8 on "The Renewed Life of God."

There is no fee to register, but you must register in order to engage the material, made available on January 6, 2021. The access code will be emailed in early January to all registered participants. Registration remains open until January 26, the final day.
