


July 18

Since then, I believe there has always been at least one woman on our church council. I have since served another term as deacon and one term as elder and I am pleased to serve again.

In our 33 years at Covenant, our son Luke and daughter Rebecca made profession of faith at Covenant; (daughter Jennifer had made profession of faith in Michigan before we moved here); Rebecca and Laremy were married at Covenant; two of their children were baptized at Covenant; my parents moved to Sioux Center and became Covenant members in their later years and their funerals were conducted at Covenant. Police Alert Residents to Scams

This notice was sent to us with a request to pass it on to our congregation.

The Sioux Center Police Department has seen a sharp upward trend in scammers attempting to defraud residents of Sioux Center of both money and personal information. These scams are done over phone calls (as well as apps like WhatsApp, Facebook, and Snapchat), email, and regular mail. Here are some of the most widely seen scams that are currently being used in the area:

Fake Prizes, Sweepstakes, Free Gifts, Lottery Scams

With this scam, people receive an email or phone call claiming they won a prize, lottery or gift, and they only have to pay a "small fee" to claim it or cover "handling costs." These scams can go under the name of genuine lotteries/sweepstakes like the National Lottery, Publishers Clearing House, and the El Gordo lottery. The scammer says before the individual can claim their prize, they must send money to pay for administration fees and taxes. The prize, of course, does not exist. No genuine lottery asks for money to pay fees or notifies its winners via email.

Fake Government Officials

With this scam, people receive an email, letter, or phone call saying it is from a government agency (typically the IRS or FBI) and it instructs you to wire, Western Union, or MoneyGram money someplace, or follow a link and enter information. "Do not believe it," Sioux Center Police Chief Mike Halma says. "The U.S. government would never instruct anyone to use those methods to pay a bill or carry out a financial transaction, par-

ticularly with an overseas bank or agency."

Relative is in Jail Scam

With this scam, the caller or emailer states he/she is your grandchild and they have been arrested. They say they need you to bail them out but not to tell their parents. They will try to get the victim to give a name of one of their grandkids. This is a trick. They ask the victim to go to Wal-Mart and send pre-paid cards, money grams, etc. NO LAW ENFORCE-MENT AGENCY WILL ACCEPT THIS TYPE OF PAYMENT FOR BOND MONEY. "If you get this kind of call, hang up and call your kids or grandkids to see if they are in jail somewhere. They are most often home or at work and doing just fine," Mike Halma says. "In general, we urge everyone to think twice before making any payments to or sharing any personal information with people they do not know."

Here are some tips to help if you receive one of these calls:

- Never give out your credit card information, your Social Security number, or any other personal information.
- It is a red flag if you are asked to wire money. Never wire money to anyone you do not know.
- Do not purchase any type of gift cards for someone you do not know.
- It is better to ask the police or someone you trust about a suspicious call than to fall victim to one of these scams. You can call the Sioux Center Police at (712) 722-0761.
