

## Wondering in Creation

I remembered my trip to the Luray Caverns while I took part in an activity in our church. It was part of the WE service which gets various aged people together to focus on faith practices. We were asked to think about something that made us experience the "wonder" of God and His abilities. Other adults and children contributed something that made them wonder and I thought of something from my past.

It was on a Girl Scout's trip that we took to Washington, DC. This was the only time we took such a long trip. I grew up in northern New Jersey, in the town of Saddle Brook. My father worked in New York City at that time, first in the Empire State Building and then in the now defunct Twin Towers. He had a distance to travel each day, but we settled in New Jersey because of the lower prices of houses.

On the trip we stopped at Luray Caverns which is a beautiful sight of stalagmites, stalactites, and flowstone formed from limestone

into interesting forms. This struck me as being magical and could only be made by our God. A God who is so powerful and creative who puts you into a web of amazement of His wonder. Luray Caverns was known



to Native Americans for a long time but was undiscovered by white men until 1878. It consists of about 1.5 miles of paths underground and is in the Shenandoah Valley west of Blue Ridge Appalachian Mountains in Luray, Virginia. Some of the forms are white but others have color because of the minerals in the limestone. Iron makes the forms red, manganese dioxide makes them black, and copper gives a blue and green tone. It has been made into a National Natural Landmark.

First unit of Clinical Pastoral Education complete—aka being a chaplain intern.

It's hard to put into words all that the past four months have been. Four months of ministering to patients, families, and staff; of experiencing the depths of pain and suffering; of becoming familiar with the medical world and especially the ins and outs of the neuro-ICU; of learning about myself, my pastoral identity, and how to care for people emotionally and spiritually in a clinical setting. As my supervisor says, CPE also stands for Courageous Personal Examination.

I consider the past four months a gift: a gift because God led me to this internship in a time when I was wondering about my call. I've always known I've wanted to do ministry, but it wasn't until I began interning as a chaplain that I felt drawn to a particular vocation and the character of it.

Here are four reflections (out of thousands) from this unit:

 We don't have answers to the "why" question, but we do have the ability to



make meaning and find meaning out of our circumstances.

- Storytelling is powerful—pitching a tent next to someone and listening to them is being a healing presence.
- The world is full of tragedy and deep pain. Each day I am reminded that things are not as they ought to be—come, Lord Jesus.
- The world is full of God and deep beauty.
   Each day I am given a taste of God's grace and action in the world—praise be to God.

One unit down-a few more to go!
