What To Do When You Can't Legally Work? Volunteer! ...and Bake

The Riazantsevs came to Sioux Center via Poland, from Odessa, Ukraine, on August 10. At the earliest opportunity our Resettlement Committee applied for an Employment Authorization Document (EAD). As of this writing (November 14) the EAD has not come. Refugees are told to check back after waiting 5 months—that would be January of 2023.

Many in the same situation have worked for cash hoping to avoid scrutiny of the authorities. But Illia and Olga have taken a different approach. They are focusing their efforts on ESL training and have found several volunteer opportunities.

Both Olga and Illia spend the bulk of their Tuesdays at Hope Haven's wheelchair ministry in Rock Valley. They work alongside Wil Alberda and other volunteers from Sioux Center.

Illia works Wednesdays and Thursdays for Zestos, a food distribution ministry in Alton, Iowa. This match has providential overtones. Zestos' manager, Rob Hofmeyer, is incapacitated with back trouble and facing a 6-month recovery period after his surgery which is scheduled for the end of November. Illia is virtually doing the "heavy lifting" for Zestos until the EAD comes.

Olga has been volunteering on Wednesday afternoons at 2nd Chance Depot. She's been given the responsibility to sort and price donated items, help decorate and organize the store, and work at the cash register. The manager of the store is familiar with Google Translate, (a phone app that helps you communicate with speakers of other languages,) and Olga's spoken English is improving. Our Town-Once Again It Inspires

This article was printed in the Sioux Center News, but we thought it might be nice to include it since Covenant was so well represented in this recent Dordt theater production. Covenant members Nico DeVries, Rowan Haan, Hannah Landman, Emilyn Smit, Elise Stiemsma, and some of our regularly attending Dordt students were in the show (along with Becky Donahue working on costumes behind the scenes!).

When the lights went down on the final act of the recent Dordt College production of *Our Town*, I said to my wife, "This play is bewitching."

What I meant was this: I have taught the play at least fifteen times. I directed productions of the play in two different high schools. I acted in the Sioux Center community theater production of the play that my wife directed several years ago. And yet, there I sat with tears in my eyes as Emily said her goodbyes to "clocks ticking and Mama's sunflowers. And food and coffee. And new-ironed dresses and hot baths . . . and sleeping and waking up."

What provoked the tears? I mean, I knew what was coming; in fact, I can still recite passages of the final act from memory. But who knows more than an 80-year-old guy about the brevity of life, the wonder of everyday events that we allow to become humdrum, the cruelty or indifference to pain we participate in without even realizing it. As another poet said, "It is yourself you grieve for."

Thornton Wilder, the playwright of *Our Town*, said that the theme of the play is "an attempt to find a value above all price for the smallest events in our daily lives." I don't think he intends to say that every time we see a sunset

or drink a cup of coffee or kiss our wife or husband "good-bye," we have to exclaim about how wonderful these events are. But it's clear he wants us play-goers to recognize that we should savor the wonders of ordinary life.

"That's all human beings are, just blind people," Emily says from the land of the dead. And so, tears come as one feels her regret and realizes his/her failures to live with more awareness.

As you may know, in Act III we see about fifteen people sitting in chairs spaced evenly over the stage. It is a graveyard and they are "the dead." At one time this scene was thought by some to be controversial. Was this how Thornton Wilder perceived of the afterlife?

Board members at Western Christian High School were concerned about this back in the late 1960's when I asked them to approve my production of the play. Thankfully several board members spoke out in support of my staging of *Our Town*, and the board approved our production of the play.

As far as I know, members of the community not only approved of the play, they were intrigued by it, and we had a fine production featuring, among others, a Covenant member, Verlyn De Wit.

That was 55 years ago, and as Emily Webb says in the play, "It goes so fast."

Notes from the Deacons

The deacons would like to invite all Covenant members to our congregational meeting on Monday night, **December 12**, where, among other things, we will review and hopefully approve our budget for 2023. In preparation for this meeting, we thought it would be good to give you a peek at what we have been doing behind the scenes on your behalf in preparation for this meeting.

As you know, our budget reflects what we hope to accomplish collectively in the upcoming year and, as such, reflects the intersection of our (and therefore our church's) priorities and capabilities. We view our capabilities as a church, including the time, talents, financial and other resources we have been given, as a gift from God. This is a wonderful blessing to the deacons; this means we don't need to view the budget with anxiety, but as an opportunity for stewardship and participating in what God is doing among us. We remember Philippians 4:6 which reminds us "Do not be anxious about anything, but in everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made known to God." Then the next verse gives us the assurance that "the peace of God, which surpasses all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus." It helps, too, that we are able to look back on how God has enabled us for nearly 50 years to do the things for which we have been budgeting!

In preparation for 2023, the deacons have examined each line item in the budget, checking with committee chairs and church employees to determine if what we are doing is what we want to continue doing, or what we might need to do differently. We look at historical trends and economic data to see what we might have been neglecting. We look at what is needed to support regular faithful worship. We examine what our classical and denominational "ministry shares" are accomplishing and what kind of continuing commitment we want to make to these efforts. We review what is needed to maintain and improve our facility or improve our stewardship. We look at inflation rates and salary and wage information for people in our area who are engaged similar tasks as our church employees, in the hope that we can balance our desire to do things effectively and efficiently with our desire to be fair and generous. We're not so much interested in minimizing the budget as having a budget that realistically reflects what we feel called and are committed to accomplish, one that enables us to do what needs to be done in a way that reflects who we are called to be. God has blessed us with an 8% increase in "active adult professing members" in 2022, and we are eagerly anticipating how these folks will be involved


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in both shaping and contributing to our mission. Praise the Lord for this additional blessing and opportunity!

In addition to the faithfulness, uniqueness, and "oneness" that our church has been focusing on, our willingness to both sacrifice and be generous is central to our mission and signals the transforming power of Christ to those outside the church. Thankfully God continues to provide, even in inflationary and/or economically difficult times. As noted in Malachi 3:10, just after reminding the Israelites of the importance of "bringing the tithe into the storehouse," God reminds the people to "Test me in this and see if I will not throw open the floodgates of heaven and pour out so much blessing that there will not be room enough to store it." So, even though Covenant does not ask "pledges" for the upcoming year, we believe this is a great time of the year for each professing member and for each family unit to prayerfully reflect on the time, talent, and finances they hope to contribute to Covenant's mission in 2023. Thanks very much for doing this!

Piano/Cello Concert




