The Swap Meet in Review

About 15 years ago, prompted by Pastor Herm Van Niejenhuis, a group of Covenant members formed a group called Creation Tenders. Our goals were to increase awareness of our place in taking care of God's creation and to encourage practices for the church and in the congregation that were kind to the environment. There were about a dozen of us who met regularly. We wrote some materials and carried out various projects. We put on a week-long summer Creation Care Camp for 4th-6th graders. Among other things, we helped start the Community Gardens, the city-wide recycling of electronics, increased recycling pick-up, and the Farmers Market. We even got the first denominational grant to support activities that encourage creation care. A small part of what we did was the Swap Meet. From a creation care point of view, we reasoned that we all have far more stuff than we need, and there are, most likely, others who can use those things. So—bring all that “extra” to the church parking lot and take away anything you need. Reduce, reuse, recycle.

We filled a third of the parking lot with stuff

in those early years. Many Covenant folks were retiring and in the mood to clean out. There were appliances, furniture, bikes, lawn tools, toys, household items, baby supplies, garden produce and books galore. We said “no” to clothes and once “no thanks” to the BB gun Howie Hall wanted to pass on. Covenant members got the first hour and then it was open to all. No money was exchanged, but once a local gentleman from another church, well off and a real garage sale enthusiast, picked up what he knew to be worth quite a bit and gave Ron Oostra a sizable check for Christian Ed. People who missed the event often found left-over goods stuffed into their church mail boxes the next Sunday.

One year Christian Ed/Fair Share Committee sold coffee and treats. One year we broadened the event into a harvest festival where members acquainted each other with such things as food dehydration, food fermentation, perennial propagation, a good recipe for everything-that's-left-in-the-garden soup. We sold produce baskets put together by the Christian Education Committee.

Creation Tenders eventually was encouraged to slow down because of the partisan political baggage that environmentalism can carry.

Creation Tenders is no longer. The Swap Meet rested a few years until Service and Missions (SAM) Committee saw it as an opportunity for outreach to the recent immigrants in our church neighborhood and took it up.

As we wanted, this Spring's Swap Meet was largely attended by

Serving at Covenant

This is part of an ongoing series about the many ways Covenant members serve in our church, our community, and beyond.

A Trip to Ethiopia with My Son, Mike

We, Mike, Tad, Sammy (two men that work with Mike) and I, took off for Ethiopia on Friday, February 24. I spoke with Mike about how he got so involved in Ethiopia. Mike remembered with pain the famine in Ethiopia from his younger years and when he sought to adopt, he thought of Ethiopia. Mike and Kim adopted through Children's Home Society which was taken over by Lutheran Social Services. However, Children's Home asked Mike to take over in 2012 and the schools came under his care too. Adoption was shut down by the government of Ethiopia and that is why Mike and Kim adopted three children from Ethiopia and last one from Uganda.

MKA ministries focuses on training people to be ministers to the country. The training might be shorter than in the U.S., but it fills the need for Ethiopia. The most dramatic part of my trip was seeing the minister preach on Sunday and 8 homeless young men and two young women were baptized. The young men go through 10 months of Bible lessons before they are allowed to be baptized.

We served a meal to 95 young people who wanted to be part of the program. The women prepared the meal on a fire made on the ground in the back of the church. We had plenty of food which was bread with a tomato and meat sauce and a white and meat sauce. Afterwards we went to several young men's rooms that the ministry has given them. In one room the two men were trained as wood workers. One of these two was baptized that morning. I can honestly say that Jesus was in his heart.

The children at the two schools did not go to school before because of the government costs of fees and the need for clothing appropriate for schools. These schools that Mike took over don't charge anything. The children are given a uniform and meals. Mothers have been taught to make uniforms and are paid for their work.

There are also accelerated schools that teach three years in one year. The programs are called ALFA and are used in various countries. They use many methods that I would advocate to use in the United States. They use group work, charts, and various jobs for each person in the class. We saw two of these classes and they worked very well with students who need to catch up for a few years they were not able to go to school.

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From Addis Ababa we went to the two villages where hunger was very apparent. We visited Hosanna and Ottoro. We were very warmly greeted with embraces and such warmth. They often very gently touched my hair. I am not sure if it was the grey or the straightness that was unique for them. We saw a bit of what they are doing and had a grand meal with the teachers from both schools. The teachers gave me two dresses and they put them on me over my clothes and took me out to greet the teachers. The spirit of the group

was amazing. They are being blessed and are not ashamed of that fact.

One evening I went to the home of my sponsored child, Aberash. She lives with her aunt and her three cousins. They very much appreciated me for being Mike's Mom. It was both pleasing to see their happiness and sad when I think of my own selfishness. The visit has made me think differently about needs and wants and I want to be part of saving, feeding, and educating these children of God.

Celebrating the Life of Thuong Lo


On April 12, Paul and I went to Des Moines to celebrate the life of Thuong Lo at the First Church of the Open Bible. Thuong was 90 years old.

Thoung Lo and his wife, Hien, (she passed in January, 2017) from Vientiane, Vietnam, along with their 4 youngest children Dara, Kingsada, Saybansa, and Toun were sponsored by Covenant Church in 1980, and were baptized at Covenant in 1982. Attending the funeral was different in many ways as they ALL wore ALL black and were very reverent and somber. The men and women sat on different sides, and the sons Bounlai, Saybansa, and Toun, each sat in a different section of the front row. The message by Mike Rasavanh (daughter Dara's husband) and the singing in both languages was wonderful.

Back in 1980, Covenant Church moved the Lo family into a New Homestead home and helped them resettle to northwest Iowa. It was a wonderful church effort that brought so much faith, learning, joy, and lasting love to

all of us! Many, many families helped so much with their physical needs of housing and a car to spiritual needs such as Bible studies and acts of kindness that each helped bring them into the family of God! While here in Sioux Center, Thuong dealt with a lot of shrapnel injury pain from his service in the war, so his life wasn't always easy.

Later, Covenant also helped them find and relocate their son, Bounlai, to Northwest Iowa. They shared with us that getting Bounlai here and Covenant praying and helping showed them that all the faithful prayers of

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God's people worked, and this really helped lead them to becoming Christians! All 8 (one child had passed away in Vietnam) of their children, grandchildren, and many friends were at the funeral even though they live in Canada, Thailand, the east coast and Des Moines. It was so wonderful to see all of them, and they asked us to really thank and "tell Covenant how much we truly appreciate them bringing our family to America and giving us a good start at Sioux Center where they came to know God and believe in Christ." They commented what a different man Thuong was after becoming a Christian.

In 1989, the family relocated to Des Moines to worship and live near their family who lived there. They became faithful followers at the Asian Open Bible Church with their son-in-law, Mike Rasavanh, as pastor. The 5 children we know best are doing well! They are all responsible, loving, and successful families!

- Bounlai Lo has recently retired from his job in Des Moines and he and his wife Vivanh will move to Florida soon to be near their daughter. He also has a son in Des Moines.
- Dara and her husband Mike Rasavanh used to live in De Moines. They have gone back to Thailand to be missionaries and are

always wonderful Christian leaders of the whole family. They have 2 children in the Des Moines area.

- Kingsada and her husband Ting Leuang used to live in Des Moines, but now live in North Carolina and have 2 boys (and they have 1 grandchild) who spoke at the funeral, and they sure are going to be Christian leaders for many!
- Saybansa Lo and his wife Nina live in Des Moines and have 2 children.
- Tounechay and his wife Phay also live in Des Moines, and Toun is still the cutest, sweetest guy!

After the service we were invited to the family home in Des Moines for a meal. It was great to fellowship with many people we knew from long ago and have their special foods that we learned to love! They even sent food home with us so we could experience it again.

Many of us feel like we are a part of each other's family. They are such dear people! We heard and reminisced about many loving stories of things the Covenant family did for them along the way, and how their lives being renewed by Jesus made them into completely different people. They are so very, very thankful for each Covenant member who touched their lives.
