And here are the answers to the questions that were printed in last month's *Courier*:

Q: What church was Covenant's "Mother Church" and where did this church meet?

- A: Sioux Center First CRC was Covenant's mother church.
- **Q:** Where did Covenant first hold Sunday services and for how long did the church meet at this site?
- A: Covenant held Sunday services in the Sioux Center Christian School gymnasium until 1982.
- Q: How many CRC churches were in Sioux Center at that time?
- A: Covenant was first referred to as "Third CRC." First CRC was organized in 1890. Bethel CRC was organized in 1922. There were no other new CRC churches until Covenant CRC was incorporated in 1974. Faith CRC began in 1979, Bridge Of Hope CRC in 2003, and Amistad Cristiana in 2009.
- **Q:** How many of the 55 "Charter Members" are still attending Covenant?
- A: Of the original 55 charter members and their spouses, 19 are still members—8 couples and 3 singles.
- **Q:** Why did the list of "Charter Members" name only 2 women?
- A: The original Charter Members list consisted of 53 men and only 2 women because only "Heads of Family" were listed. The list included all men except one widow and one single woman.

Roof Refresh Update

Six weeks ago, Covenant approved the Roof/ Refresh proposal the Covenant Capital Campaign Committee (CCCC) was established. Our

roofing contractor agreed to start in June and good things are already happening. The CCCC decided very quickly that our high-and-increasing interest-rate environment required that we develop a plan to minimize interest costs. A decision was made to split the campaign into two phases: a Phase 1 "Raise the Roof" campaign aimed at quickly paying for the roof through short-term pledges and cash gifts (that could be fulfilled by the end of 2023), followed by a more conventional Phase 2 for the sanctuary refresh projects which might need financing and payoff over a longer period.

Our ambitious "Raise the Roof" plan embraced the challenge of quickly raising a significant amount of cash to pay 50% of the roof cost by the start date. With still-incomplete campaign plans, we turned to two groups in a unique position to make pledges and initial gifts within a short time frame: (1) CCCC members and (2) church Council members because of their close involvement in the development of the project. Since there was an already-scheduled June 12 Council potluck to welcome new elders and deacons, the Committee quickly developed a "Raise the Roof" presentation for this captive audience. Fundraising experience also indicates that campaigns tend to be more successful when those currently tasked with leading an organization demonstrate their commitment to a project in tangible ways.

Thankfully, Committee members and some Council members were able to make quick commitments and gifts. By God's grace these gifts, plus the balance in the building fund, allowed us to make the required \$80,000 downpayment on the roof. The response to our bulletin announcements requesting private loans from congregation members also makes us hopeful that the campaign can be completed with little or no commercial borrowing.

This is, of course, just the beginning. But it gives us great optimism as we share this information with all of Covenant. Our committee has a 10-minute presentation to share with each of you. Please sign up for one of the 4 timeslots on July 16 or Aug 6 so we can share our progress and answer your questions. We will also share a pledge card that we request be returned by August 13. We will meet in the Youth group room in the basement and you can sign up online at <u>bit.ly/CCCC</u> or call or email Sara at the church office to reserve your spot.
