# Raise the Roof Progress

The purpose of the Covenant Renewal Campaign is to celebrate and steward our worship space.

Earlier this year total project costs were estimated at \$450,000. Of that, \$180,000 was budgeted to repair our roof. The **Raise The Roof** (RTR) goal was to collect \$180,000 in cash by January 1, 2024.

Here's the play-by-play:

- The contractor's bid of \$162,000 was less than we expected.
- To our pleasant surprise, no plywood needed to be replaced.
- New gutters (\$5,400) and a sloped roof over the organ (\$6,300) brought total project costs to approximately \$173,700-a nice chunk below the \$180,000 estimate!

As of this week we have received 54 RTR pledges and/or gifts totaling \$157,743. All but \$38,200 of the pledged total has been received in cash. The committee hopes to raise \$16,000 in new gifts before the end of the year so that RTR is fully funded.

The second phase of our campaign, **Raise Our Voices**, will begin in the first half of 2024. Phase II will provide funds for sanctuary renovation, an update of our sound and projection equipment, and improved lighting. This larger amount, approximately \$270,000, will be raised over a three-to-four-year period.

The Campaign Committee wishes to thank the many people who generously supported this effort. It was a joy to observe the deep affection many folks have for Covenant CRC. We praise God for His provision.

We want to thank everyone for their generosity in giving to the roof project to protect our building from the elements, hopefully for another 75 years. If you have not yet had the chance to speak with someone from the "Raise The Roof" team, we encourage you to do so as we are oh so very close to raising the full amount of funds to complete the roof payment this year. Soon, the fundraising team will begin the "Raise our Voices" campaign for the Sanctuary refresh project to start in the new year!

Next year has presented us with a unique opportunity in our budget in that our Christian Education commitments are drastically reduced. In light of discussions and comments from council and church members, we are seeking to expand the mission outreach of our church with some of these freed-up funds. We know we are in the middle of a capital campaign, so we will continue to prayerfully and carefully navigate the best way forward as a church seeking to be a light in God's world. We are still working to figure out all the finer points of what the ESA program means for the rest of this year and how it will impact where we allocate gifts now and in the years to come. We ask that you pray and consider along with us how best to reallocate funds for missional work and Christian education in the world abroad.

Finally, we want to remind you that we would love to see ALL of you (yes—each and everyone one of you!) at the congregational meeting in early December.

# Serving at Covenant

This is part of an ongoing series about the many ways Covenant members serve in our church, our community, and beyond.

Dear Covenant Family,

We have been blessed with a once in a lifetime opportunity to learn about and serve the local communities in Tanzania this Christmas! Along with learning about a new culture and experiencing a beautiful part of creation (one that is very different from Sioux Center), we will be sitting in on surgeries, helping out in the hospital however we can, learning about the local medical care, and serving in the orphanage and village. Our goal is to get experience in a different culture and learn about how medicine is used in a place of much less privilege than here. We strive to bring the love of Jesus to the local people in Tanzania and to help and serve in any way we can.

We have committed to be part of a group at Dordt called AMOR (A Mission Outreach). For nearly two decades, Dordt has participated in international vision/mission projects throughout the world. This year, our group will be going to Tanzania in December during Christmas Break, leaving on December 20 and returning January 10.

For this trip, we will be partnering with STEMM, a local US non-profit agency that ministers in areas of education, medical care, and community development, mainly for children, from a decidedly Christian viewpoint. STEMM is an interdenominational Christian ministry whose main focus is developing a relational bridge between Siouxland and Tanzania by addressing the priorities of spiritual growth, medical care, and educational opportunities. You can learn more about STEMM and even ways that you can become involved in this ministry at <u>stemm.org</u>.

There are expenses associated with such a project. Each member of the team needs to raise approximately \$4,500 to cover costs related to travel (this is the biggest cost by far), food, and materials to be used at the work sites. We are writing our friends and family to ask for your assistance in a couple of ways. First, please pray for us as we prepare for this project, for the ministry that we will assist, and for safety in travel. Secondly, if you are able and willing to contribute financially to this ministry, we would be very grateful. Even a small amount would be such a blessing!

First up is World Renew's World Hunger 2023 drive. The children will be working on collecting money in their Peter Fish, but as a

family you can also participate in the "Dinner for Good" campaign. Make a dinner date, perhaps invite some of your friends, but instead of going out, prepare a simple meal to share at home and then donate the money you would have spent to end hunger in the world. Second, we want to encourage you to participate in the reverse food offering for Mid-Sioux Opportunity, Inc. After the service on two upcoming Sundays, we will be handing out slips with suggested non-perishable food items and

hygiene products. The food pantry at Mid-Sioux is a necessary resource for many struggling households in our community and it needs a good restocking as we approach the holiday season. Please consider grabbing a few or a handful of slips from the baskets located near the offering boxes in the rear of the sanctuary. If you didn't get an opportunity to grab a slip you can still drop off nonperishable food items like canned vegetables or fruit, boxed dinners, pasta and pasta sauce, dried beans or rice, pancake/waffle/ cake mixes, ketchup/mustard/pickles or other condiments, cereal/oatmeal/breakfast bars, etc. Please drop off your food items to the boxes in the back of the West Lobby by the bulletin boards.



Finally, soon you will again find the Christmas Giving Tree in the Fellowship Hall. This is another Mid-Sioux Opportunity campaign to provide Christmas gifts to under-privileged families, elderly

people with limited resources, and disabled persons in Sioux County. The Giving Tree will be in the Fellowship Hall during November, so please grab some slips and return the wrapped gifts with the slip taped to the outside of the wrapping to church by December 8. Last year Mid-Sioux Opportunity was able to brighten the holidays for almost 100 households because of the generosity of people like you, so a big thanks if you have participated in the past and/or are willing to give this season.
