Note from the Pastor

The Prayer Practices

C.S. Lewis encourages us to offer the Lord's Prayer early in our daily lives. In that way, we can listen first and foremost to the voice of our Father relating us as his beloved children and discipling us into people who can follow Jesus. W. David O. Taylor encourages us to conclude our days with a prayer practice called "Examen." In that way, we can also conclude our days by listening primarily to our loving Savior God in a way that prepares us to follow Jesus the next day.

Most readers of this piece have heard often about and from C.S. Lewis and the Lord's Prayer. W. David O. Taylor and the Examen practice are less familiar, so I will pass on a brief introduction to them. You may remember that I referred to them in a recent sermon from Matthew 25, in which Jesus calls us to live as people prepared for his arrivals in their various forms. A few people asked for a review and some further information regarding Taylor and Examen, so here they are.

Taylor guides us toward Examen in a fruitful book he wrote about the Psalms called *Open and Unafraid: The Psalms as a Guide to Life*. Eugene Peterson describes the book as a combination of stories and Scriptural studies that help us pray honestly in ways through which God makes us more whole and holy. (p. xvii) With that and related goals in mind, we can note that Taylor gives the name "Honesty" to the first chapter in his book about the Psalms, and, in conclusion to that chapter, he provides several prayer practices, which include the exercise called "Examen."

Having learned this prayer practice from a group called "The Society of Jesus," Taylor

passes on the five steps in the practice, which I have slightly adapted and can be summarized as follows:

Examen Steps:

- 1. Presence: seek increased awareness of God's presence.
- 2. Gratitude: review the day in the light of God's faithful presence and give thanks.
- Feelings: pay attention to your feelings, trusting God to speak to you through them.
- 4. Spirit and specificity: focus on a strong feeling or event and ask for the Spirit's illumination.
- Prepare: look ahead to tomorrow and trust our Good Shepherd Lord to prepare and provide.

Although I have not yet come to practice Examen in as daily a way as I offer the Lord's Prayer, I do find it a good and even godly way

So this Advent and Christmas season as we gather for worship, we will be asking ourselves "How does a weary world rejoice?" Read on for an introduction from A Sanctified Art:

Christ was born into a weary world. King Herod ruled the land with a legacy of ruth-lessness. The Romans treated the people of Israel with contempt, imposing harsh taxes and land seizures that forced many into subsistence farming. Poverty and destitution were pervasive. And yet, Christ was born, bringing good news of great joy for all people.

As Advent comes again to a weary world, we ask, "How does a weary world rejoice?" From the opening chapters of Luke's Gospel, we have found a few answers: we acknowledge our weariness, we find joy in

connection, we allow ourselves to be amazed, we sing stories of hope, we make room, we root ourselves in ritual, and most importantly, we trust our belovedness. In the parallel birth stories of Jesus and John, joy arrives—despite trepidation, fear, or grief. In these stories, we find rhythms for rejoicing. As we move through our series, we hope to create space for acknowledging the weariness of our world while celebrating God's closeness with great joy.

And so, this Advent, we will hold space for our weariness and our joy. We will seek a "thrill of hope" in our hurting world. We will welcome joy—even if, like the prophet Isaiah, we cry out for comfort (Isaiah 40:1). In this weary world, may we find many ways to rejoice.

We look forward to worshiping together this Advent season!

Love Came Down at Christmas, But Love...

This morning I was working with a group of women at the elementary school preparing materials for teachers. We are known as the Tuesday ladies. The teachers consider this a great gift of love to them. We cut and paste and organize, and we enjoy doing it around a big table while we settle a lot of world problems. It's a gift of love to us too. Today I asked the others to give me the first thought that popped into their head if I said the word love. This month's topic is all about love.

This afternoon my friend Marilyn, called me. She lives in Florida and calls me a couple of times a week. Sometimes she is lonely. Sometimes she has important things to tell me. She has lived with and cared for both of her parents in their last years. Recently her mother died. Now Marilyn lives alone. I have grown to love Marilyn in the tenderest of ways. Several years ago it seemed important for Marilyn to tell me that she has Asperger's. The conversation that followed was a long, interesting discussion about her symptoms and actions. I had known this about her but we never talked about it—and we have never talked about it again. However, she recently called to ask me if I thought she was smart! I was shocked by the question because Marilyn is brilliant in many ways and has an incredible memory for events, details, dates, and her past. I affirmed her and gave her many reasons why I thought this was true. I decided to ask her what came to mind if I said the word love. Without hesitation, she said, "Well, I think of a person who sees a need and takes care of it. She doesn't wait for someone else to do it but just goes for it." She then proceeded to tell me a story about a man she knew who was evicted from his home and had no people and nowhere to go. She and her mother helped him find a travel trailer converted into a

small home. They were able to get him into it, even loading up her car to move his belongings. Within a year, he had a stroke and had to go to a nursing home. For the next six years until he died, Marilyn visited him several times a week, bringing him little gifts and, occasionally, McDonald's meals.

What a perfect expression of extravagant but humble love.

Immanuel, God is with us. Yes, love came down at Christmas, but Love was always here. God Himself, in the form of the babe Jesus came so He could dwell among us and demonstrate His unconditional love. He wept with His friends and He weeps with us. He healed strangers and outcasts. He taught us how to pray. He showed people how to get along with one another as the Church and how to care for the poor and the widows and orphans. He performed miracles by feeding thousands of hungry people. It demonstrated His power which He wants us to depend on today. He helped us realize and understand what has always been—and that is God's unconditional love for us from the beginning of time. He died a crucifixion death to pay for our sins so we could be with him eternally. He created us to love us and for us to return love to Him and others.

Micah 6:8 asks, "And what does God require of us?" The answer is to do what is right, to love mercy, and to walk humbly with our God.

This Christmas I am again thankful that love came down to show us the way and remind us of what has always been, the unconditional and eternal love of God the Father toward us, His children.
