From the Council

The Council wants to pass along to the congregation a summary of the Classis lakota meeting that was held in March. When we move back into our sanctuary, we hope to be able to gather after a worship service for dialogue regarding this Classis meeting. Pastor Joel, Chris Goedhart, and Dwight Van Tol were our delegates and can add some further observations, and we will open the floor for some questions and answers during that time.

Highlights of the March 5 Classis Iakota Meeting held at Trinity CRC in Rock Valley

Much time in the morning was spent deliberating over several proposed overtures to synod. Four overtures were finally adopted.

- An overture which asks synod to declare that Heidelberg Catechism Q&A 108 and sexual ethics (along with all unrepentant sin) are salvation issues based on Heidelberg Catechism Q&A 87.
- An overture which asks synod to amend Church Order, Supplement, Article 5-B which has to do with regulations concerning the procedure to be followed in the submission of a confessional-difficulty gravamen (an official grievance/concern about some aspect of our creeds and confessions).
- An overture which asks synod to re-examine ecumenical relations with the Reformed Church in America in light of recent developments within that denomination.
- An overture which asks synod to call on all CRC churches who have publicly stated that they are no longer willing to call practicing same-sex relationships a sin to either repent of their decision or disaffiliate from the CRCNA.

Classis granted the requests of Barry Miedema, Trevor Mouw, Nathan Nieuwendorp, and Thomas Soodsma to have their respective licenses to exhort be renewed for another two years.

Having received word from Bridge of Hope Ministries that the job descriptions for Sam & Gail Ashmore were clarified, the Classical Interim Committee shared that Sam & Gail may now be ordained as Commissioned Pastors in the CRCNA.

Elections which took place throughout the day led to the following results:

- Bob Drenten to serve on the CRCNA Council of Delegates
- Kurt Monroe, pastor of First CRC in Sioux Center, to be the Minster delegate to synod
- Stan Wynia, from Bethel CRC in Sioux Center, to be the Elder delegate to synod
- Jevon Groenewold, from First CRC in Sioux Center, to be the Deacon delegate to synod
- Drew Hoekema, pastor for Platte CRC, to be the fourth officebearer delegate to synod

Note from the Pastor

After the Anniversary?!

At our 50th anniversary service on April 28, we will read and pray these words from God: "One generation commends your works to another; they tell of your mighty acts." (Psalm 145:8) We will also sing that prayer in the hymn "One Generation Will Call to the Next." (LUYH 562) And further, we will live out those words from God in all kinds of ways, including by the renewing of our baptisms.

To renew our baptisms, we can think of Paul's baptism teachings in Romans 6, in which the Apostle teaches that we live out our baptisms by dying to sin and rising to new life in Christ. (See Romans 6:1-11; see also Ephesians 4:22-24, where Paul teaches us to put off our old selves and put on our new selves.) In addition, we live out Jesus baptizing all his people with his Holy Spirit on Pentecost (Acts 2:17) by devoting ourselves to four central practices, as revealed in Acts 2:42:

- 1. The Apostles' Teaching
- 2. The Fellowship
- 3. The Breaking of Bread
- 4. The Prayers

At this point, I encourage you to ask yourself: In what ways do I devote myself to those practices? And as you consider that question, both personally and communally, you can also consider some hopes and plans we can explore after Easter.

My hope is that as we return to our refreshed sanctuary, we can engage in some postworship gatherings we call "Edifying Engagements." So in May we hope to regather in our sanctuary after worship, in order to explore together what it means to be a member of the body of Christ, both specifically in regard

to the body at Covenant and also in regard to the one body around the world.

My further hope is that after we celebrate Pentecost on May 19, we can devote time to baptismal renewal in various ways on May 26. Perhaps some of our young members will profess their faith. Perhaps some of their peers will stand alongside them to renew their baptisms also. And perhaps every member of the congregation can consider visiting the baptismal font at some time in order to remember that, as truly as we can see and touch the water there, so truly has Jesus anointed us with his Holy Spirit.

In conclusion, I can share that I feel deeply grateful to our Lord for liturgical baptism renewals I have experienced at the Jordan River (in 2017), at Sandy Hollow (in 2022), and at a preaching and worship seminar (in 2023). Friends, in Christ, let's find all kinds of ways to renew and live out our baptisms together!

Note from the Deacons

Deacon and Building Refresh Finance Update

The deacons and the Finance Committee would like to thank you for a healthy financial start to 2024. Some of you pay attention to the graphics in the Courier that show shortage and surpluses in the churches accounts, but because most churches (including Covenant) operate with a cash-based accounting system, those numbers can be misleading. For example, if some of our senior givers write large checks from their retirement IRAs at the beginning of the year (as they do), our revenues can look great in January but will tail off as the year unfolds. And, if we pay our entire property insurance policy for the year (which we did in January), our expense total could make it look like we are in trouble. On the other hand, if we pay ministry shares or missionaries only every three or four months (which we do), our expenses in January and February could look to be way below budget when, in fact, they are not. Fortunately, the deacons keep an eye on this and make the adjustments needed to allow us to say with confidence that our financial position is healthy as we near the end of the first quarter of the year.

And, as the Refresh work winds down and we reflect on our goal of fully paying for this


work within four years, we are also making some important accounting decisions that will keep us on the right track. One of the more important of these decisions involves trying to predict the percentage of Refresh giving that will come in via "as needed" versus designated gifts, because this affects how much should be transferred to the Building Fund from General Fund each month. In addition to our "repairs and maintenance budget, the deacons are currently transferring a total of \$2,500/month to the Building Fund (\$1,833/ month toward our \$6,200 monthly goal for Refresh contributions and \$667/month to fund "other special projects"). This means that our "as needed" givers are still giving something to the Refresh Project, even though your contribution receipt may (only and correctly) indicate a gift to the "General Fund." It also means we need \$6,200 - \$1,833 = \$4,367 in gifts designated to the Building Fund to meet the \$6,200/month needed to pay off the principal and interest on our loans within four years. Thankfully, designated Building Fund contributions averaged \$5,964/month in January and February, so we are more than keeping up with this goal.

In addition to healthy General Fund and Building Fund contributions, our members have continued to support Christian Education at healthy levels. And, because of the hard work and enthusiasm of the Coven-ANTs who

were printed in last month's *Courier*:

- Q: When we're back in our sanctuary, Covenant will again have access to our pipe organ originally installed in the 1970s. How many pipes does this organ have?
- A: According to Lois Vander Zee, there are 1,230 pipes!

- Q: How many contractors have been or will be involved in the sanctuary remodel?
- A: There have been a total of 5 contractors:
 - Schelling Construction has been responsible for the general construction work building walls, the new stage and sound booth, and the finish trim work.
 - Ten Kredit Electric has been responsible for the installation of the new lighting system and the infrastructure needed for the new sound and video systems.
 - RDI is providing the new sound and video equipment and providing the set up and programming for these systems.
 - Van Muyden Painting did the texturing and painting in the sanctuary.
 - Furniture Mart will be providing and installing the new carpet at the platform, choir loft, and sound booth.
- Q: How many new lights will be installed in the sanctuary?
- A: There are 26 new downlights at the high lay in ceiling, 19 new downlights recessed in the sloped wood ceiling, 12 new down lights in the soffits at the north and south sides of the sanctuary, the 2 existing choir spotlights which are reused, and 6 theatrical spotlights used for highlighting the new platform space.
- Q: How many sound system speakers will be installed?
- And here are the answers to the questions that A: There will be 2 new main speakers hung over the pulpit area, a fill speaker at the west side of the sanctuary, a fill speaker at the choir loft area, and the 3 existing speakers located on the south wall of the fellowship hall. So a total of 7 speakers will make up our system.

planned and executed a greatly successful auction and monster salt sale (thank them if you see them), we are well ahead in the amounts needed to meet our commitments for the 2023-24 school year. Because of this. the deacons would like to encourage members to make a one-time gift to the Building Fund in lieu of one of their regular gifts to our Christian Education this spring so we can pay off the Refresh project ahead of schedule. For check writers this would require remembering to change the payee on one of your regular Christian Education checks; for Vanco givers, it means choosing the Building Fund option, and for "as needed" givers it means notifying the deacons that you approve us

applying the 20% of a gift ordinarily allocated to Christian Ed to the Building Fund. As is always the case, gifts of any amount are greatly appreciated because, as with volunteering at Covenant, widespread participation is a blessing to all.

Please give thanks with us for God's continued blessings as reflected in the safety that was granted to the Refresh workers, the joy we are experiencing being back in our dedicated worship space, and our ongoing gratitude for the giving of Covenant members.

A: The correct answer is zero. There will be 2 projectors used to project on the 2 new walls at the platform, but we are not planning on using screens. We have invested in high quality projection equipment and used a smooth finish on those walls with the intent of not installing dedicated screens. This was to try to have the projection enhance our worship without being a focal point.
