Update on Building Project & Financing

Now that the work is complete and we are enjoying the fruits of our laborers, it is time for an update on the Refresh project expenditures and fundraising.

First, we are finished paying the Refresh bills! When we add the \$248,234 paid in 2024 to our 2023 expenditures, the total Refresh phase ended up costing \$281,075. This is just 2% over our original estimate of \$275,000, which is very good news given the challenging business/pricing environment of the past few years and the fact that we added a few unplanned extras because the timing was right (like painting our worship space and installing matching carpet in the choir loft area). The total also includes rental payments to SCCS that were not included in the original estimate.

Secondly, we have completed our loan solicitation and our borrowing topped off at \$215,000, which is less than half of the \$180,000 +\$275,000 = \$455,000 that we budgeted for the entire Roof/Refresh project. Loans have been staggered by maturity date over the next four years with terms that should allow us to keep interest costs at or below budget even in our uncertain economic environment. (Our goal remains paying these loans off early.)

Finally, the following illustrates the Refresh giving in the first quarter of 2024:

The deacons plan to continue to allocate a portion of as needed gifts to the Building Fund (as is also done for Christian Education support) even though the Refresh giving is above budget. The reason for this is that giving at Covenant tends to be strongest at the beginning of each year, while sometimes lagging in summer months. So, even after this allocation, we also remain well ahead in our General Fund giving at the end of March (by nearly \$15,000).

It should also be noted that the Repairs and Maintenance line item on the budget we passed in December will be under some pressure because the Building Committee chose to do three additional things to the building (unrelated to Refresh) while the contractors were around. These were replacing the antiquated fire alarm system (strongly recommended by our insurance company), refinishing the sanctuary floor, and replacing fellowship area ballasts and

fluorescent bulbs with newer more energy efficient LEDs. The total cost of these projects was \$17,045.74. So we continue to encourage members to maintain their overall level of past giving (and, for some families, to add a portion of the benefits received from ESAs) so these expenses can be covered in 2024.

The bottom line is that we should remain grateful for how overall giving, and particularly the Refresh Project and its financing, have unfolded in the first quarter of 2024. Our ongoing hope is that in the wake of the blessings we are experiencing, support for the General Fund, Building Fund, and Christian Education Fund will all remain strong. If this happens, the deacons would like to consider an "Edifying Engagement" time focusing on whether our priority should be getting out of

debt (which would enable us to fund more outreach in the future) or blessing others with budget surpluses as soon as possible.

"Research and promote congregational awareness, commitment, and involvement with respect to critical justice and mercy issues in today's culture."


While being very aware that many Covenant members have been actively connected with this type of work for decades, our committee has had conversations on a variety of issues including:


