The Ephesian Way

Pastor Joel's Study Leave Report

Listening to scholar NT (Tom) Wright regarding Ephesians went as well as I expected. Meeting some fellow disciples at the seminar went even better than I expected. Thank you, Covenant, for enabling me to take two weeks of study leave, which included listening to a series of lectures by NT Wright in Houston, Texas. Those lectures and various conversations have led me to explore what I'm calling "The Ephesian Way."

As you may know, the phrase "The Colossian Way" flows from a ministry called "The Colossian Forum," which we have practiced five times here at Covenant. When we follow "The Colossian Way," we seek to live out the biblical teaching that "in him [Christ] all things hold together." (Col. 1:17) Seeking to stay together and hold all things together in Christ does not mean we deny disagreements or the need for decisions. It does mean we see differences as a means to deepen our discipleship. When we listen to each other's stories and exchange thoughts with respect, we can

grow closer to one another by growing closer to Christ.

My new phrase, "The Ephesian Way" seeks simply to build on that biblical truth. Paul's epistles to the Colossians and the Ephesians have much in common, and NT Wright emphasizes that Ephesians gives even more emphasis to our Lord's vision of a new creation in which God is all in all. (Eph. 1:22-23) In his lectures regarding Ephesians, Wright emphasized that the Apostle seeks both unity and holiness because when followers of Jesus come and stay together with both those qualities, we help people and even spiritual powers receive a vision of God's new creation. In light of that biblical truth, Wright emphasized the church's vocation to reflect true humanity in Christ.

Now, as to what that vocation means specifically for our congregational life at Covenant, I look forward to exploring this Ephesian Way with you and all members. We can all seek to practice the biblical teaching that it takes all the Lord's people "to grasp how wide and long and high and deep is the love of Christ." (Eph. 3:18)

Note from the Deacons

We're in the second phase of a three-year rollout for the ESAs, which means we have a better understanding and know everything we need to know, right? Well, not exactly... Yes, we have a year of experience and a better grasp of how the support process works and the various ways families receive support. However, we still don't know the percentage of families that qualify, which prevents us from understanding the full impact. This uncertainty raises questions about our Christian education support and Covenant's long-term plan.

For the 2024-2025 school year at SCCS and Unity, Covenant has decided to maintain the same approach as last year. Covenant will not provide funds to families that qualify for ESAs (\$7,826 per student) and will give \$3,627 per student to those who don't qualify. Similarly, Unity will continue with last year's decision: \$1,000 for ESA students and \$2,800 for non-ESA students.

We successfully paid our church contribution to both SCCS and Unity for the 2023-2024 year by the end of June, totaling \$95,880!

We are thankful for the support of ESA funds

for our Covenant members. We also appreciate the volunteers who are currently serving and those who have served on our Christian Education Committee in the past. The purpose of the Christian Education Committee is to help raise funds to support Christian education for Covenant members. If you feel you can contribute to our church in this way, we would love for you to be a part of the Christian Education Committee.


ful daughters who inevitably keep me on my toes.

FOR YOUR INFORMATION

We would like to alert you to an important item in the Covenant church kitchen. It is hanging on the wall above the telephone. Know what it is?

A FIRST AID KIT!

Exciting, right? Exciting only when you need it!

The kit above the telephone should take care of most cuts and bruises. It includes:

- bandages
- gauze dressings and tape
- antiseptic cleansing solution and wipes
- antibiotic creams
- eye wash solution
- scissors and tweezers
- thermometer strips
- smelling salts
- plastic non-latex gloves

In addition to this little box we have added more! A second box of medical supplies is located in a labeled cabinet above the refrigerator in the church kitchen. This box includes:

- · additional larger dressings
- instant ice pack
- · ace bandages
- aspirin

- antacid (Gaviscon)
- blood pressure cuff and stethoscope
- CPR barrier mask
- extra supplies for the smaller kit

Unless you are a particularly tall Dutchman you will need a step stool to reach either of these kits. The step stool is located behind the kitchen door.

Take a few minutes to locate the kits so that in case of emergency you will be better able to be of help.
