Note from the Deacons

The deacons want to thank God for the blessing of congregation members who have both the resources and motivation to support God's work through Covenant. Even though many Covenant members had a tough year, 2024 General Fund giving ended \$5,710.62 above budget, Christian Education Fund giving was \$15,953.32 above budget, and the Building Fund was \$13,915.97 above budget. As we had hoped, blessings related to ESAs and good gifts from God have spilled over into continued generous giving—as we had hoped they would.

Despite our usual high level of expenditures in December, as we paid all remaining budgeted obligations for 2024, including several months of missionary support and ministry shares, our General Fund expenditures ended up \$19,642.87 below our budget. We see God's grace in this, and the blessing of leaders who continue to steward the funds in their individual budgets, and members who hold overall expenditures in check through a willingness to volunteer their time and talents. The major under-budget categories were pastor's health insurance, church utilities, 50th Anniversary expenses, the absence of additional building-related "Special Projects" (beyond Refresh),

and lower-than-budgeted payments to our Young People's Intern. This means our General Fund balance grew to approximately two months of budgeted expenditures which makes our Accountant and Treasurer's jobs easier as we are able to pay bills without checking balances and take advantage of discounts related to prepayments.

Both the Compassion Fund and Building Fund balances were also healthy at year end, despite a busy year of expenditures. Because the Compassion Fund was replenished by spontaneous gifts after mid-year flood relief disbursements, we were able to commit to buying a serious quantity of wood in December so one of our members (whose initials just might be SC) could build new storage cabinets for Rock Valley Christian School's art program. Refresh-related giving accelerated in each of the final four months of 2024, bringing us to a YTD total of \$88,315.97, \$13,915.97 (18.7%) above the budget of \$74,400 set by the Capital Campaign Committee/deacons for interest payments and debt liquidation. Although no loans were paid off in December (in anticipation of a full year of interest payments on January 15), we expect to pay off approximately \$20,000 in loans in late January which will take our outstanding

balance down to \$165,000. This bodes well for "burning the mortgage" in the spring of 2027.

The Missions Fund grew to \$3,053.74 and the Young People's Fund balance grew to \$7,847.54 after the Lasagna Supper fundraiser before the congregational meeting earned more than a thousand dollars. Special offerings to the thirty not-for-profits organizations Covenant supports also increased approximately \$8,000 year-over-year, giving the deacons the end-of-the-year privilege, for example, of sending a total of \$5,000 to two Rock Valley organizations—one that suffered major losses during the flooding and another that expanded its mission to better aid the relief efforts.

Assuming generous giving continues in 2025, the deacons will remain in the enviable position of deciding what to do with the surplus. As noted at the Congregational Meeting, two of our top priorities will be supporting those desiring Christian Education who struggle to afford it and paying down our debt. One of the first things we plan to do is fund an expansion of the Teacher's Garden started by Sos and Kara Maletoungou to provide many valuable resources to Christian school teachers in West Africa. As we consider additional stewardship opportunities, please continue to feel free to share your thoughts with us.
